2014 West Chicago Railroad Days Recap of event by: Western DuPage Chamber of Commerce

The 2014 Railroad Days event, while remaining at Reed-Keppler Park had a new site. The Carnival was located on the north/west ball field and the vendors, stage, beer garden and restaurants were staged on the south/west ball field, both on the furthest west edge of the park.

Fireworks were cancelled due to weather conditions on Saturday which turned out to be a good call as the park was evacuated shortly after 9:15pm. The emergency plan for the event was followed and when the threat of a tornado was received everyone at the park, including carnival and chamber management staff were directed to vacate the park as well.

The overall layout worked well for crowd management and although it was a more intimate setup we received many positive comments about it. Managing the band load-in and load-out was the greatest challenge. We anticipated complaints about the longer walk into the park but did not receive any.

The parade was very well attended and Sunday's first DJ fest was well received by the audience. The food choices were varied and the quality and pricing seemed to work. One vendor however was stopped from serving and raw food (about 80lbs) was discarded by the event manager. A report was filed with the DuPage County Health Department who complimented our staff for the aggressive oversight during the event.

The carnival was very popular and a couple of new rides replaced others that had been at the event in past years. The flow of attendees through the carnival and the main event area was very good.

The beer garden revenue was down over \$11,000 a decrease of 43% compared to 2013 but with heads up management the revenue from this activity declined by only 7% from the previous year. There were no reports of problems at the beer garden or main entertainment area and only one report from the event that we were aware of. The one problem that we were aware of; a group of youths were making trouble with another group and were removed from the park immediately by police

We have been informed by the park district that new construction will begin sometime in the late spring or summer of 2015 and that plans should be made by the City to relocate the event for at least next year as accessibility to the only remaining area within the park suitable for the event will be lost to construction activities.

We encourage the City to share any feedback that has been received about the event with us should any further comments be received.

RE: ENGINE BRAKING

Recently, the City received noise complaints related to commercial vehicles using their engine braking systems to slow or stop. Engine braking is a brake system used primarily on semi-trucks, or other large commercial vehicles, which when engaged, uses engine compression to slow the vehicle. The system is typically engaged when the truck needs to come to a quick stop. When the engine brake is engaged, the truck's engine emits a louder than normal sound. Police Department staff was asked to identify the positive and negative aspects of enacting an ordinance regulating the use of excessive engine braking.

As part of the research to answer the above question, I reviewed Chapter 625 of the Illinois Compiled Statutes, Act 5, Section 12-602.1, which gives municipalities the power to enact an ordinance to regulate the use of excessive engine braking. To issue a citation for this type of an offense and prevail in court, the police officer issuing the citation must prove that the driver of a commercial vehicle engaged in "excessive engine braking"; however the statute provides no objective standard as to what constitutes "excessive engine braking". Additionally, the police officer must be able to prove that the vehicle did not have an "adequate sound muffling system in proper working order", which would be impossible for a police officer to do without subjecting the vehicle to an inspection by a certified mechanic.

After reviewing 625 ILCS 5/12-602.1, I contacted ten police departments in our area (Bartlett, Batavia, Carol Stream, Glendale Heights, Lombard, Plainfield, St. Charles, Warrenville, Winfield, and Wheaton) and asked if their municipalities had enacted an ordinance regulating excessive engine braking. Only two of the ten municipalities (Plainfield in 2006 and St. Charles in 2008) have enacted ordinances regulating the use of excessive engine braking. The City of St. Charles enacted the ordinance in response to a single resident complaint. The staff member from the Plainfield Police Department that I spoke with did not have the historical data as to why the Village enacted the ordinance. During individual conversations with representatives from the Plainfield Police Department as well as the St. Charles Police Department, I learned that neither of the two agencies had ever enforced the ordinance. When I inquired as to why the ordinance was not enforced, I was told that it was due to the state statute's subjectivity, as well as the



protection built into subsection (d) of the statute, which allows drivers to use an engine braking system in order to avoid a collision, regardless of whether the system emits excessive noise or not.

I spoke with City Prosecutor Bill Belmonte and asked for his legal opinion pertaining to the enforceability of this type of an ordinance. Mr. Belmonte indicated that because of the statute's subjectivity and built-in defense, the City would have difficulty successfully prosecuting this type of offense. The same question was asked of Judge Mary O'Connor, who is assigned to hear West Chicago's traffic court cases at the Wheaton Field Court. Judge O'Connor echoed Mr. Belmonte's opinion and further indicated that in her view, the need for large trucks to use the engine brake in order to avoid traffic collisions outweighs the public's annoyance by the engine sounds emitted when this safety system is engaged.

As documented above, my research identified several negative aspects relating to the enforceability and prosecution of ordinances regulating excessive engine breaking. I was not able to identify any positive aspects to the City enacting an ordinance regulating excessive engine braking.

Please let me know if you have any questions related to this document. A copy of 625 ILCS 5/12-602.1 is incorporated below for your review.

Sec. 12-602.1. Excessive engine braking noise signs.

- (a) A county or municipality may post signs that prohibit the driver of a commercial vehicle, as defined in Section 1-111.8 of this Code, from operating or actuating any engine braking system that emits excessive noise. The Department of Transportation may erect and maintain the signs on interstate highways near residential areas or communities.
- (b) The sign shall state, "EXCESSIVE ENGINE BRAKING NOISE PROHIBITED". The Department of Transportation shall adopt rules providing for the erection and placement of these signs.
- (c) This Section does not apply to the use of an engine braking system that has an adequate sound muffling system in proper working order that prevents excessive noise.
- (d) It is a defense to this Section that the driver used an engine braking system that emits excessive noise in an emergency to avoid a collision with a person or another vehicle on the highway.



(e) A violation of this Section is an equipment violation punishable by a fine of \$75. (Source: P.A. 96-523, eff. 1-1-10.)
