Also, parking probably should also be restricted on Conde Street between Joliet Street and Wilson Street (not all the way to Route 59). This section of road is narrow and dangerous when cars are parked along it, however; this amendment may negatively impact a few single-family residential property owners who would lose the ability to park (or have visitors park) in front of their homes.

Given the number of single-family residential homes on Augusta Avenue, restricting parking on both sides of the street would create an undue burden for a number of residents in that area, and staff does not recommend that parking be prohibited on both sides of the street.

If the Public Affairs Committee members are interested in making any of these changes, the Code would need to be amended to reflect such.

At the February 22, 2016 meeting, Committee members requested additional information on the following: current parking restrictions and a map of the above-described areas and a copy of the December 10, 2015 email. Please see the attached email, map and memorandum concerning parking restrictions for more information.

Recently, the City was made aware of a parking concern regarding street parking on Conde Street, Wilson Avenue and Augusta Avenue; therefore, an Agenda Item Summary was drafted to address the concerns. On February 22, 2016, the Agenda Item Summary was presented at the Public Affairs Committee meeting. At the conclusion of the meeting, Staff was directed to provide additional background information before amending the Code.

The current parking restrictions on Augusta Avenue are as follows:

- No parking on the south side, between Joliet Street and Illinois Route 59.
- No parking on the north side, between Illinois Route 59 and a point one hundred fiftyfive (155) feet west of the west right-of-way line of Illinois Route 59.

The current parking restrictions on Conde Street are as follows:

- No parking on the north side, between Joliet Street and Illinois Route 59.
- No parking 7:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on school days, south side from a point one hundred fifty (150) feet east of east right-of-way line of Joliet Street to Wilson Street, except for holders of permits for residential parking duly issued by the City to residents on these streets.
- No parking 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. except weekends and holidays, south side from Blakeley Street to Illinois Route 59.

The current parking restrictions on Wilson Avenue are as follows:

- No parking on the west side, between Spencer Street and Conde Street.
- No parking 7:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on school days, east side from Spencer Street to Conde Street.



Introduction: This year the WE GO Run will once again be held at the Leman Middle School. This is our opportunity to show the community who West Chicago School District is by hosting it at our largest school.

- Police Services: Would hope to get same support that we have in previous years from West Chicago Police Department. Understand that we will not get street closures but for the initial start of the race would need traffic held for approximately 10 minutes. Police have also assisted in key busy intersections.

ORDINANCE NO. 16-0-0012

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 10 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE OF THE CITY OF WEST CHICAGO REGARDING NUISANCE WEEDS AND NATURAL LANDSCAPING AREAS

WHEREAS, the City deems it appropriate at this time to amend Chapter 10 of the City Code to revise the regulations currently pertaining to weeds and natural landscaping areas; and

WHEREAS, the proposed revisions to the weed regulations are intended to more accurately identify specific weeds that are considered to be noxious, exotic or a nuisance; and

WHEREAS, the proposed revisions to the natural landscaping areas regulations are intended to establish limitations on the permitted locations of said areas on a lot.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of West Chicago, Du Page County, Illinois, in regular session assembled, as follows:

<u>SECTION 1:</u> Chapter 10, Article I, Section 10-3 (b) of the City Code entitled "Noxious, exotic and nuisance weeds" is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following language:

- "(b) *Noxious, exotic and nuisance weeds.* It shall be unlawful for any property owner to permit the growth of any of the following within the city regardless of height, and all of the following are hereby declared to be nuisances:
 - Noxious weeds: Common ragweed, giant ragweed, marijuana, musk thistle, Canada thistle, kudzu, perennial sowthistle, soughum-almum, Queen Anne's lace, garlic mustard, Johnson grass, and any weed as defined in the Illinois noxious weed law (8 IL Administrative Code 220).
 - (2) Nuisance weeds: tall, common or European barberry, further known as Barberis Vulgaris or its horticultural varieties."

<u>SECTION 2:</u> Chapter 10, Article I, Section 10-5 of the City Code entitled "Natural landscaping areas" is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following language:

Sec. 10-5. - Natural landscaping areas.

(a) Purpose. The use of wildflowers, native grasses and other native plants in a managed landscape design can be economical, low-maintenance and effective in soil and water conservation. The intent of this section is to allow property owners to install, cultivate, and maintain natural plantings, not to allow vegetated areas to be unmanaged or overgrown. The presence of any of the noxious or nuisance weeds listed in section 10-3, or of common turf grass species or common weeds growing above eight (8) inches in height, is an indicator of neglect and shall not be considered an allowable element of any natural landscaping area.

- (b) Natural landscaping area defined. A natural landscaping area is any open area of a lot that is purposefully planted, cultivated and maintained with native herbaceous plants, wildflowers, or other plantings planted and/or designed to establish and maintain a natural appearance.
- (c) Native herbaceous plants defined. A native herbaceous plant shall include any species of herbaceous plant designated as native or naturalized in commonly accepted scientific publications such as "Plants of the Chicago Region", by Floyd Swink and Gerould Wilhelm (1994), "Wildflowers of the Tallgrass Prairie, the Upper Midwest", by Sylvan T. Runkel and Dean M. Roosa (1989), and "Field Guide to North American Wildflowers, Eastern Region", by the Audubon Society (1979).
- (d) *Natural landscaping areas permitted*. Natural landscaping areas shall be permitted on any lot, subject to the following restrictions and requirements:
 - (1) Annual cutting. Wildflower and native herbaceous forbs and grasses within natural landscaping areas shall be mowed or cut to eighteen (18) inches or less at least once prior to June 1 of each calendar year.
 - (2) Natural landscaping areas shall maintain the following minimum setbacks from property lines:
 - a. Ten (10) feet from any front or corner side yard lot line.
 - b. Two (2) feet from any interior side or rear lot line.
 - (3) Natural landscaping areas shall not cover more than ten (10) percent of an actual front or actual corner side yard.
 - (4) Natural landscaping areas shall not cover more than twenty-five (25) percent of an actual interior side or actual rear yard.
 - (5) Natural landscaping areas shall not be located or maintained in the public right-ofway, unless installed or maintained by the appropriate government agency responsible for maintenance of the right-of-way.

(6) Natural landscaping areas shall not be located or maintained so that they obstruct the view of motorists at any intersection of public streets.

- (7) A permit shall be required for any natural landscaping area that exceeds five thousand (5,000) square feet of the area of any lot.
 - a. *Application for permit.* Permit applications shall include a site plan drawn to scale on a plat of survey, the location of the plant materials, a list of plant materials by common name, north arrow, location of structures, fences and paved areas, and a maintenance schedule showing approximate dates and frequency of annual cutting, weed control, and monitoring for encroachment onto adjoining property or public sidewalks.
 - b. *Review*. The city shall issue the permit if the application complies with the provisions hereof.
 - c. *Term.* The term of natural landscaping permits shall be perpetual, unless terminated. The permit shall run with the land and be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the owner and its successors in title. Permits shall not be required annually after the first issuance unless a change is to be made.

Ordinance 16-O-0012 Page 2 of 4 (e) *Enforcement*. If an owner or one in control of a plot of ground used as a natural landscaping area violates any part of this section, the abatement procedure in section 10-3 shall be enforced.

SECTION 3: That all ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such conflict, are expressly repealed.

<u>SECTION 4:</u> That the City Clerk of the City of West Chicago be and is hereby directed to publish this Ordinance in pamphlet form, pursuant to the statutes of the State of Illinois.

SECTION 5: That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication in a manner provided by law.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of West Chicago, Illinois, in regular session assembled, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. That Chapter 17 - TRAFFIC, ARTICLE XVII. - SCHEDULES OF DESIGNATED STREETS; DIVISION 3. - STOP INTERSECTIONS; Sections 17-176. -Designated; compliance required, of the Code of Ordinances of the City of West Chicago is hereby amended by adding thereto the following language:

"Meadowview Crossing. All Meadowview Crossing traffic shall stop for all Fieldcrest Drive and Meadowview Drive traffic."

"Meadowview Drive. All Meadowview Drive traffic shall stop for all Fieldcrest Drive and Meadowview Crossing traffic."

<u>Section 2.</u> That all ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such conflict, expressly repealed.

<u>Section 3.</u> That this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect ten (10) days from and after its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.

INTRODUCTION

The City of West Chicago has requested that Thomas Engineering Group, LLC (TEG) determine if stop control is warranted at the intersection of Meadowview Drive, Fieldcrest Drive, and Meadowview Crossing. The intersection to be studied is currently a non-signalized, one-way stop controlled three way intersection comprised of three residential streets located in the Prairie Meadows Subdivision. The north leg of Fieldcrest Drive is currently stop-controlled.


EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

According to the MUTCD criteria, no stop control is warranted at this intersection. However, based on the criteria to be considered by MUTCD and the data gathered, TEG recommends the following:

- 1. Maintain stop control at Fieldcrest Drive
- 2. Install stop control at Meadowview Drive
- 3. Install stop control at Meadowview Crossing
- 4. Install pavement markings to identify crosswalks connecting existing curb ramps

An aerial view of the intersection is shown below.





EXISTING CONDITIONS

The Prairie Meadows Subdivision is only accessible through two entry points – one at Prairie Crossing Drive and another at Meadowview Crossing. R5-2 (NO TRUCKS) and R11-3 (LOCAL TRAFFIC ONLY) signs are located at each entry point. Each residential street has a speed limit of 25 mph. At the intersection, current traffic control conditions include one stop sign, controlling the north leg. An unmarked school bus stop is located at the southwest corner of the intersection. Two curb ramps are located at the southeast corner of the intersection and two more curb ramps are located at the southwest corner.




Figure 2. Existing Conditions at Intersection

FIELD OBSERVATIONS / DATA COLLECTION

The team collected intersection traffic data during AM and PM peak periods on December 9, 2015. The counts were taken from 7:00 - 9:00 AM and 4:00 - 6:00 PM. All counts were taken manually and were broken into 15 minute increments. The peak hours of the intersection occurred at 7:00 - 8:00 AM and 4:15 - 5:15 PM. Passenger cars and single units (school buses, utility trucks, delivery trucks, etc.) were counted separately. A summary sheet that shows the raw count for each approach is included as *Figures 5 - 12*.

During the AM observation period, the southwest corner of the intersection was used on three occasions by school buses to pick up students. The first bus arrived in the 7:00 - 7:15 AM interval and the second and third buses arrived in the 7:45 - 8:00 AM interval. Pedestrians observed during AM hours consisted of both parents and students.

The driveway for 668 Meadowview Crossing directly accesses the intersection, causing a possible safety concern for vehicles backing out of the driveway. In addition, the driveway is used by other residents of the suburb to not only drop their children off, but to wait at the bus stop as well. During the AM observation period, four vehicles used the driveway as a drop off point for their children. One vehicle stopped in the middle of the intersection to drop off their student.

STOP CONTROL WARRANT REQUIREMENTS

Single Stop Control

According to the *Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices*, 2009 Ed. (MUTCD), STOP signs should be used at an intersection if one or more of the following conditions exist:

- 1. An intersection of a less important road with a main road where application of the normal right-of-way rule would not be expected to provide reasonable compliance with the law;
- 2. A street entering a designated through highway or street; and/or
- 3. An unsignalized intersection in a signalized area.

Looking at the characteristics of the intersection, the intersection does not meet any of the above criteria.

Additionally, per MUTCD, the use of STOP signs should be considered at the intersection of two minor streets or local roads where the intersection has more than three approaches and where one or more of the following conditions exist:

- 1. The combined vehicular, bicycle, and pedestrian volume entering the intersection from all approaches averages more than 2,000 units per day;
- 2. The ability to see conflicting traffic on an approach is not sufficient to allow a road user to stop or yield in compliance with the normal right-of-way rule if such stopping or yielding is necessary; and/or
- 3. Crash records indicate that five or more crashes that involve the failure to yield the rightof-way at the intersection under the normal right-of-way rule have been reported within a 3-year period, or that three or more such crashes have been reported with a 2-year period.

Along with the fact that the City of West Chicago Police Department has reported no crashes at the intersection in the past three years (2013, 2014, and 2015), the low traffic volume at the intersection indicates that a single stop control device is not warranted.

Three-Way / Multi-Way Stop Control

According to the MUTCD a multi-way stop control can be useful as a safety measure at intersections if certain traffic conditions exist. Safety concerns associated with multi-way stops include pedestrians, bicyclists, and all road users expecting other road users to stop. Multi-way stop controls is used where the volume of traffic on the intersecting roads is approximately equal.

When considering the installation of multi-way stop controls, the following criteria should be noted:

- 1. Where traffic control signals are justified, the multi-way stop is an interim measure that can be installed quickly to control traffic while arrangements are being made for the installation of the traffic control signal.
- 2. Five or more reported crashes in a 12-month period that are susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation. Such crashes include right-turn and left-turn collisions as well as right-angle collisions.
- 3. Minimum volumes:
 - a. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from the major street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day; and
 - b. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour; but
 - c. If the 85th percentile approach speed of the major-street traffic exceeds 40 mph, the minimum vehicular volume warrants are 70 percent of the values provided in Items a and b.
- 4. Where no single criterion is satisfied, but where Criteria 2, 3a, and 3b are all satisfied to 80 percent of the minimum values. Criterion 3c is excluded from this condition.

Examining the data taken from the traffic study, the volume of vehicular and pedestrian traffic at this intersection does not meet the minimum traffic volume as the greatest number of vehicles observed was 79 vehicles/hour.

Thus, a multi-way stop sign installation is not required.

Although no stop sign installation is required, per MUTCD, a multi-way stop control should be considered if it would improve the characteristics of the intersection where two residential roads intersect, each having similar design and operating characteristics. Given this MUTCD criteria to be considered, and that a school bus stop is located at the intersection, TEG recommends a multi-way stop control installation to provide a measure of safety.

ALTERNATIVE METHODS OF IMPROVEMENT

Crosswalks

To further the safety of any pedestrians, marking out the crosswalk connecting the existing curb ramp on the north side of Fieldcrest Drive to the receiving curb ramp on the southeast corner of the intersection and the crosswalk connecting the curb ramp at the southwest corner to the receiving curb ramp at the southeast corner of the intersection may be considered, as shown in *Figure 5*. Marking where and how a pedestrian crosses the street would help to designate the right-of way for motorists to yield to pedestrians by warning them to expect pedestrian crossings and to indicate the crossing locations.




Figure 4. Proposed Crosswalks

RECOMMENDATION

According to the MUTCD criteria, no stop control is warranted at this intersection. However, based on the criteria to be considered by MUTCD and the data gathered, TEG recommends the following:

- 1. Maintain stop control at Fieldcrest Drive
- 2. Install stop control at Meadowview Drive
- 3. Install stop control at Meadowview Crossing
- 4. Install crosswalks connecting existing curb ramps as seen in Figure 4

The intersection does not experience high traffic volume or high vehicular speeds, but the unique geometry of the intersection provides inadequate intersection sight distance for any approaching vehicles from Fieldcrest Drive or Meadowview Drive. A stop control at each of these two approaches would provide greater safety. Additionally, a stop control at Meadowview Crossing would limit the risk of any vehicular turning movement and potentially reduce driver confusion of right of way. Finally, due to the location of the bus stop at the intersection, the installation of crosswalks connecting existing curb ramps is recommended for pedestrian safety.
