

- "So many other events happened that day that our hearts went out as a nation to all those people who were lost, and America wept." Darby S.
- —"I was a student at Northern Illinois University. I remember that many students skipped classes to watch TV sets in residence halls, and at the student center. We were all dumb struck—was this really happening? Classes were held as scheduled, but I couldn't bring myself to attend. I stayed in my apartment, watched TV and prayed that my cousin, who worked in the World Trade Center, was okay."

- "After the first plane hit, a daughter called and told me to watch TV. So I saw the second plane hit. I watched from then on. I did not know anyone in New York." -Pat S.
- —"When I arrived at O'Hare (from London) on the 15th of September, it was a surprise event. My plane was the only one I could see moving at the airport. It was a concrete ghost town." - Donald S.
- —At the time, we lived in Carol Stream, right in the flight path to O'Hare. The silence that afternoon was deafening. I was so used to hearing planes fly overhead and now there were none. I can recall closing as many drapes and blinds as I could out of pure fear now that I wasn't being distracted by the details of organizing and planning. I remember thinking, "What about our daughter—how could we bring a new life into such a scary world?" Katherine W.
- —Beautiful alabaster building, filled with beautiful lives, destroyed by the racial hate of a few. My tears are still fresh. My country and my heart will always remember-American #11 and #77, United #93 and #175, and the 343. Tina G.
