 - 19 municipalities, townships, special use areas in

- 6 landfill business in 2019. So historically and
- 7 currently, they still have a large focus on
- **8** diverting as much material from landfills as
- **9** possible. And they provide other services

 - 14 is located on Powis Road, directly across the

 - 18 industrial area. It is a very unique facility
 - 19 due to its large size. Many facilities of this
