Unlike any other year in modern history, 2020 has tested us individually, as a community and as a nation. As Thanksgiving approaches though, it is fitting to share an example of the good work that continues moving us forward; work that feeds the body, mind and spirit of our community. The City wishes you a happy and healthy Thanksgiving.

Hearts and hands working together (albeit socially distanced), along with training, funds, and a hearty dose of resilience, have resulted in a bountiful fall harvest that will assist in providing food security and nourish neighbors on the east side of West Chicago.

The seeds of the story were planted pre-COVID, in October 2019. Local residents and members of First United Methodist Church of West Chicago, Michael and Judith Horsley, attended an educational program through Global Ministries called EarthKeepers.

The training program equips United Methodists throughout the United States for environmental stewardship. It serves as both a launch pad for people looking to turn an idea into action, and an incubator for people who want to deepen an existing ministry.

Participants develop plans in conversation with their peers, troubleshooting ideas and sharing strategies. Upon completion of the training, EarthKeepers are asked to launch an environmental project in their communities and can apply for United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) grants to support their work.

Judith's project idea was to expand the two raised-bed gardens built by the Boy Scouts on the property of the First United Methodist Church of West Chicago into a second community garden that would supplement the existing one at St. Michael's Church on the City's south side.

Long story short, and many involved community members later, a grant for \$4,993 was awarded in December 2019 and plans for spring implementation was set – but for a global pandemic which halted the building of the raised-bed gardens and the recruitment of community members to grow vegetables.

Not to be discouraged, Global Ministries offered an extension to accommodate the community's ability to push the build date to August 8th and the new gardens were built and planted by volunteers from Northwestern Medicine, The GardenWorks Project, and Healthy West Chicago.

Tomatoes, peppers, cabbage, Swiss chard, cucumber and winter squash will continue to be harvested through the fall and distributed at the Neighborhood Food Pantry on Fremont Street, and 2021 will bring a renewed effort to offer the gardens to host families.

This fall, take note of these friendly reminders:

- Leaf removal:** When removing leaves from your lawn, remember never to blow or rake leaves onto the street.
- Brush collection:** The last two brush collections for the year will take place the weeks of October 5 and November 2, 2020. Only place branches at the curb the weekend prior to these dates.
- Parking:** Park on hard surfaces only (and never on the grass) and ensure any vehicle parked outside has current plates and is in operable condition. Beginning October 16, 2020, relocate any RV or boat parked on the driveway to an approved surface in the backyard or other storage facility.
- Garbage containers:** Only place containers at the curb after 6:00 p.m. the day before pick up and then put containers away and out of public view by the end of your pick up day.
- Permits:** Permits are always required for siding and/or roofs. Permits for windows or doors are only required if you expand or reduce the size of the existing opening.

2021 City Renewals – Due by December 31, 2020

Annual Business Registration – Please renew your organization’s business registration by completing the registration form and paying the \$30.00 renewal fee. Around October 1st, your business will be mailed the required renewal form. You may also renew your registration online at <https://westchicago.org/business-registration/>.

Residential Rental Licensing – If you own a rental property in the City, remember to renew your license(s) by the end of the year. Look to receive your renewal paperwork in the mail by November 1st. You may also download a license renewal form from the City website. All debts due and owing the City associated with each property must be paid to get a 2021 license.

West Chicago’s efforts in the fight against **COVID-19** continue and recently expanded to include regional strategies to help mitigate the health and economic impact of the pandemic on individuals hardest hit in DuPage County.

In coordination with Mayor Richard Veenstra of the Village of Addison, I was part of a coalition of Mayors and municipal leaders of DuPage County to collaborate on ways in which to tackle the rising number of COVID-19 cases in our communities.

We all agreed that in the short-term, a targeted approach is necessary to bring down the disproportionately large number of infections and positive tests in the Latino population of DuPage County. Improving the socioeconomic and health status of our communities was identified as a long-term goal.

Contributing factors related to economic issues of unemployment, sick pay, childcare, food insecurity, and access to healthcare were discussed, as were the social, mental and educational concerns of isolation, substance abuse, domestic abuse and the need to return students to school safely.

A coordinated program of education to slow the spread through preventative measures and testing was outlined, and various means of dissemination of materials were explored.

The resulting recommendations include consistent, coordinated communications throughout partnering communities via print materials distributed at essential businesses and organizations such as supermarkets, food pantries, schools (through backpack programs), daycare facilities and other appropriate distribution points.

An enhanced literature dissemination program like the one we began over the summer, which provides reminders about basic health and safety measure during COVID-19, will be expanded through the support of the DuPage County Health Department in each participating community.

The virus knows no community boundaries. We must all work together, washing hands frequently, social distancing, and wearing masks if we want to continue to reduce our case numbers and keep everyone safe and healthy.
