Street, provides both employment and job training in a not-for-

profit environment.

Its mission has remained the same for more than 15 years, which is "to provide people with disabilities the opportunity to lead fulfilling lives and to train and work in a supportive, safe and caring environment while producing and providing products and services to the community". Those retail products and services include a wide variety of flowers, bedding and vegetable plants, hanging baskets for every season,

and handcrafted garden accessories made by team members.

For the last four years, volunteers from the Illinois Extension Master Gardeners of DuPage have assisted team members at We Grow Dreams as gardening mentors and coaches. According to We Grow Dreams Executive Director Gregg Bettcher, "Their presence here has added a great deal of plant expertise, teaching practices and, of course, invaluable volunteer hours. Combined with their efforts and

the hard work of our team members, we regularly log more than 100 hours of work per week, making it possible for our organization to meet our planting goals."

The collaboration with the Master Gardeners Program has yet

another benefit. For the past four years, its volunteers have planted vegetables in raised beds which We Grow Dreams team members harvest and donate to the Northern Illinois Food Bank. By the end of August 2021, over 175 pounds of assorted vegetables have been donated, and the beds continue to produce tomatoes and peppers, with squash due in September and October. People helping people, help people - that is a harvest of goodness.

FROM THE MAYON

S WE CLOSE OUT THE YEAR, I am happy to report on our progress with the Central Main Street Redevelopment Plan.

The original Plan, created in 2007 and updated in 2017, lays the groundwork for transit-oriented development, focusing on residential units that will capitalize on the proximity to Metra and encourage greater use of current downtown amenities.

Eight new townhouses are on track for the empty lot at the southwest corner of High and Center Streets, with garages and access from the alley. The City-owned property is in the process of sale to the developer. Construction should begin later this year, with completion in 2022.

In-depth discussions are underway with the developer of

two luxury apartment buildings along Main Street on the east and west sides of Chicago Street. The building proposed is four stories tall, containing 225 total residential units, plus a 4,500 square foot commercial space. The total cost of construction is \$49,000,000, and the construction would likely start in 2022. The developer is seeking assistance using bonds associated with a new TIF District, after the existing one is terminated prior to expiration.

A 24-unit apartment building is currently under construction on Main Street just east of City Hall. This developer specializes in housing for disabled residents.

It's great to finally make progress on a redevelopment plan that will no doubt benefit current and future generations of West Chicagoans.

What is a **Plat of Survey** and why is one needed to obtain certain building permits?

PLAT OF SURVEY IS A
DOCUMENT THAT IDENTIFIES

the property lines and dimensions of a parcel of land. The Plat of Survey includes structures such as houses, garages, sheds, driveways, patios, etc. To create this type of map, the land must be surveyed and certified by an Illinois licensed land surveyor.

Submitting a Plat of Survey is required when applying for a building permit for the following projects:

- $\cdot\;$ Additions to a House
- · Stoops or Stairs
- · Detached Garages or Sheds
- Fences
- Driveways
- · Pools
- · Decks, Patios and Porches
- · Pergolas

A Plat of Survey is the only way to determine important information related to reviewing and approving

your request for a building permit, such as:

· Property line setbacks

· Total lot area

Total hard surfaces

 Identifying the area and location of existing property improvements

It is also important to have this document available if there are questions on where your property lines are or where a structure is in relation to a property line.

Typically, buyers receive a Plat of Survey when they purchase property. Check your closing documents from the purchase of your home. You might also try checking with your real estate attorney

to see if he/she has a copy. Finally, if you still cannot locate one, you will
