Garbage Rate Changes Begin January 2023

The City's garbage and recycling pickup service provider, Groot Industries, Inc., will increase its service charges for residential solid waste collections as part of a contract with the waste hauler. The new service rates will be effective as of January 1, 2023.

Multiple Dates Scheduled for Waste Transfer Station Siting Application Public Hearing

s part of the review process, the City of West Chicago is required to hold at least one public hearing as part of the siting and application process for the construction and eventual operation of a solid waste transfer station facility at the site of 1655 Powis Road.

As per the requirements set by Section 39.2 of the Illinois Environmental Protection Act that govern the siting process, the public hearing is to be scheduled no earlier than 90 days, but no later than 120 days, from the receipt of the application, which was received by the City on Friday, September 16, 2022.

In meeting these requirements while also trying to achieve the goal of providing the community with adequate time to attend the hearings, the following Public Hearing dates, times, and locations have been set for January 2023:

• Tuesday, January 3 from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. at Wheaton Academy (900 Prince Crossing Road)



• Wednesday, January 4 from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. at Wheaton Academy (900 Prince Crossing Road)

• Thursday, January 5 from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. at Wheaton Academy (900 Prince Crossing Road)

• Tuesday, January 10 from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. at Wheaton Academy (900 Prince Crossing Road)

• Thursday, January 12 from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. at the West Chicago Community High School (326 Joliet Street)

Although multiple meetings have been scheduled, some later meetings may be not be necessary and may be canceled.

The City has provided detailed information on its website over the past few months, which includes: an explanation of the City's role in the siting process; background information about the proposed facility; a digital copy of the formal application received from the applicant; an overview of the siting process; and information on how to submit comments for the public hearings.

The City asks residents to please note that a statement justifying the siting decision must be made in writing by the City Council, and the Council cannot simply decide that it does not want a transfer station or another transfer station located within the City limits.

City Council Passes 2023 Annual Budget

uring the West Chicago City Council's meeting on December 5, the Council adopted the annual budget for the City of West Chicago.

The City's Annual Budget serves as a comprehensive financial plan and strategic guide for the City as an organization. It provides a forecast for anticipated revenues for the coming fiscal year, as well as adopted expenditures that guide the services provided to the residents and businesses.

The 2023 Annual Budget totals \$52.3 million, which is an increase of 6.31% as compared to the 2022 Budget.

Some highlighted larger expenditures for the 2023 Fiscal Year include the following:

• \$600,000 for costs associated with the remediation of property along West Washington Street;

• \$1.7 million for the engineering and construction



improvements to the City's Sanitary Lift Station #5; and • \$3.1 million for City-wide road improvement projects.

Also, as part of the 2023 Annual Budget, the City will be proceeding with other substantial projects that include conducting a space need analysis as the preliminary phase of the process of building a new City Hall facility, and renovating Sesquicentennial Park into a larger grounds display in partnership with Ball Horticultural.

City Water and Sewer Rate Changes Begin July 1, 2023



he City of West Chicago will be increasing its water and sewer rates in 2023 as a response to inflationary pressures and inventory issues. The new service rates begin July 1, 2023.

Please see the following updated services fees to water and sewer rates. All rate changes go into effect regardless of meter size.

Water Service

• For water services, residents and business will see an increase from \$5.00 to \$9.00 for each 1,000 gallons of water used that exceed the initial 2,491 gallons used.

Sewer Service

• Residents and business will see an increase from \$7.00 to \$10.00 for all usage.

There are no changes to the fees associated with the minimum usage charge, nonresidential sewer pretreatment rates, or billing charge.

Chicago's plan was especially unique as it was created in both English and Spanish within the same overall document.

Additionally during October, the National Forum for Heart Disease and Stroke Prevention presented the City and Healthy West Chicago with the 2022 Public Policy Award. This national award was presented in response to the continued advancement of making walking and active living more accessible to more people in West Chicago.

Last, and most recently, the City once again adopted a balanced budget in December that will ultimately guide West Chicago's plans for the future ahead. The 2023 Annual Budget calls for some important infrastructure items, along with some other exciting endeavors including a preliminary study that will guide the decision making process for a new City Hall facility. It has most certainly been an exceptional year, but I'm also very much looking forward to the future.

In 2023, the City is planning another community art experience in the downtown area similar to 2022's 'Year of the Alebrijes' art display. The new art experience will provide a unique environment for residents and visitors to explore during the summer season.

Additionally, residents will see an update to the grounds at Sesquicentennial Park. The transformed display will be done in collaboration with Ball Horticultural and will provide for a beautiful new space for all to enjoy.

As a resident and Mayor of West Chicago, I'm proud of the achievements our City continues to make each year. While we welcome 2023 to West Chicago, I hope that you and your loved ones have a happy and healthy New Year.

Reminders for Snow Removal for Residents

During the winter months, the City encourages residents to remain prepared for the inevitability of snow. Provided are reminders regarding the City's policies for snow removal.

City Ordinances for Resident Snow Removal

The following actions are prohibited by City ordinances:

• Parking on streets after two inches or more of snowfall.

• Plowing or shoveling snow from driveways or sidewalks into City streets.

• Placing of ornamental rocks or other objects along the curb line.



Roadway Snow Removal

The City is divided into seven plow routes, which allows for at least one snow removal truck working in all areas of the City during a snowfall.

City crews will initially work to

clear primary roadways that are more frequently traveled, and then work to clear secondary roadways that generally consist of local streets, side streets, and alleyways that have less traffic flow. During heavier snowfalls, secondary streets may not be plowed until after the snowfall stops. Cul-de-sacs are done last as there is less space to dump snow without burying driveways, mailboxes, streetlights or fire hydrants.

Please note, the City will not be responsible for damage to improperly installed mailboxes or to boxes damaged by thrown snow.

City Sidewalk Snow Removal

The City does not remove snow from sidewalks other than in front of municipal properties and from the A. Eugene Rennels Bridge.
